Our regional councils offer recreational ski racing sanctioned by the **Far West Racing Association** (FWRA). We use a handicapping system for our racers, grouping racers by age groups and based on racing skills and experience. This allows members of all abilities to have fun and be competitive within their racing class. Recreational racing is a great way to improve your skiing techniques.

FWSA has established relationships with the National Ski Council Federation (NSCF), National Brotherhood of Skiers (NBS), US National Forest Service, International Ski History Association (ISHA), United States Ski & Snowboard (USSA), the United States Ski Team, Women's Ski Jumping USA, (now under USA Nordic Sport), North American Snowsports Journalists Association (NASJA), and Snowsports Industries America (SIA). We are strong supporters of the National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) Environmental Charter and have endorsed their "Sustainable Slopes" objectives. We are active participants in the informal and bipartisan Congressional Ski & Snowboard Caucus. Our goal is to effectively represent the interest of all our members and the snowsports public.

We will host our **90th Annual FWSA Snowsports Convention** in Boise, Idaho at the Grove Hotel, June 15 - 18, 2023. The FWSA Convention includes fun and educational programs, and the opportunity for club members and leaders to meet with representatives from ski resorts and tour operators to plan future travel. The Snowsports Trade Show and Silent Auction on Friday night is a popular event, which is open to the public. Attendees can bid on terrific trips, often acquired at great prices. Council Services Links FWSA to Councils & Clubs

The role of the Vice President of Council Services is to provide a platform for all Council Presidents of the Far West Ski Association to enhance communications and conduct a variety of programs. The group meets several times a year to collaborate and administer these programs down to the club level.

Council Services oversees the following FWSA Programs:

- Club and Council Communication and Outstanding Club Awards
- Social Media Award
- Councils' Volunteer of the Year Recognition
- Charities & Our Community Recognition

The club and council awards and recognition programs provide an opportunity to recognize hard working volunteers. Our committee chairs strive to administer competitions that are relevant and easy to enter.

Bill King, who chairs the Club and Council Communications and Outstanding Club **Awards**, has made the submission and judging process much simpler thanks to his hard work. The clubs and councils submit their newsletters and upload a link to their website to be judged. The editors and administrators of the website are rewarded for their efforts for keeping their information current. An electronic Medallion is given to the clubs and councils for them to display on their website or newsletter.

The **Social Media Award** has had another great year with clubs and councils submitting many entries. The program uses Facebook as the social media platform for this award. The judging criteria is based on metrics derived from the percentage of audience, activity, engagements and reactions. Todd Hood is the Social Media Award chair, and has also been providing ongoing social media Facebook tutoring throughout the year.

This year the program formally known as the Councils' Man and Woman of the Year, was officially changed to Councils' Volunteer of the Year. One candidate is chosen to represent their council at the FWSA Convention. Each candidate is invited to attend a social reception, FWSA luncheon at a special table, and participate in an oral interview. Sheri Parshall chairs the program and coordinates with each candidate to ensure they have a wonderful experience. We are grateful to **Big White Ski Resort** for their continued sponsorship of the program over many years. Big White provides a ski trip for two to the winner to the resort.

The Charities & Our Community Program, chaired by Sigrid Noack, conducts a recognition process that highlights the good work our clubs and councils do to benefit their communities. Clubs and councils provide an enormous amount of support to local and national charities. During the FWSA Convention the clubs and councils charity efforts are showcased by a video presentation.

Council Services strives to provide roughly 150 FWSA ski clubs with tools and information to successfully serve their members. National Ski Council Federation (NSCF) Brings Councils & Clubs Together Nationwide

The Far West Ski Association and member councils and clubs are all members of the National Ski Council Federation. The Federation provides Far West councils an opportunity to interact with ski councils in the central and eastern United States to exchange ideas and receive valuable information for our member clubs.

The Federation offers members a variety of attractive discounts on items such as ski rentals, lodging, car rentals, travel insurance and a variety of ski gear. To access the benefits and other Federation information, ski club members can go to the Federation website **www.skifederation.org** and request a password. Ski clubs can post their trips on the website to attract new members through their trip offerings.

The Federation was excited to conduct the 2022 Annual Meeting face to face September 8-10, 2022, in Whitefish, Montana, home to Whitefish Mountain Resort. Our host, Ryan Billiet of Averill Hospitality, provided, in cooperation with local partners, some pre-meeting activities that included mountain activities at Whitefish Mountain Resort and a sightseeing tour of nearby Glacier National Park. We stayed at the beautiful Lodge at Whitefish Lake, an Averill property. The Lodge graciously offered the conference room rate to delegates who wished to come early or stay over.

The Friday meeting featured presentations and discussions among the council delegates and our industry partners. Saturday morning was a business meeting, followed by more joint sessions with industry partners in the afternoon.

NSCF elects officers every other year for two year terms. The following officers were elected at the August 2021 virtual meeting: President, Cheryl Mann (Texas Ski Council), Vice President, Michael Calderone (Metro New York Council), Secretary, Joe Harvis (New Jersey and Sierra Councils) and Treasurer, Linda Walker (Florida Ski Council). Like FWSA, the Federation is completely operated by volunteers.

The Federation was formed in 1999 to provide ski councils an opportunity to exchange information and to discuss among themselves and with the ski industry important issues that impact clubs and councils throughout the United States. The Federation represents 29 councils across the US. These councils have 640 clubs with more than 300,000 club members.



We had an exciting 2022 travel year, with our North American Ski Week to Aspen/Snowmass, the Zermatt Utah Mini Trip, and the Denali Tour and Alaska Cruise. People were happy to be traveling again and experienced the "new normal" for traveling with COVID.

Some of the things that can be expected with today's travel are getting tested for COVID prior to entering a country, boarding a cruise ship or air flight to an international destination. There may be cancellations or modifications to excursions, shuttles, and air services, fewer hotel porters, or restaurant servers, fewer travel guides or shuttle drivers, and all the result of a lack of workers to fill the various jobs. You might experience longer waits for restaurant seating, restaurant closures, or find that banquet style restaurant service is common over ordering meals from a menu, all due to a staffing shortage.

Some nice surprises were reduced numbers on cruise ships, excursions, buses, and hotels. There seems to be a focus on customer service with staff willing to go out of their way to assist travelers and make sure the travel experience is positive. One thing was evident as we experienced the "new travel norms" for COVID testing, mask wearing, and social distancing was that people were willing to follow the safety protocols so they could continue to travel, explore, meet new friends, and have a good time.

I invite you to check out the many trips offered by Far West Ski Association with their North American and International Travel programs. The North American travel program offers trips for ski club and direct members to destinations in North America, Canada, and U.S. territories. Our Annual Ski Week is extremely popular, offering activities for skiers/boarders and non-skiers. We have a week of skiing/boarding, parties with dancing, racing, and opportunities for shopping and winter activities in the area. Far West Ski Association councils sell the trip and plan their own activities, as well. This is a great opportunity to meet people from your council, enjoy one of the many ski resorts in the country, and have a lot of fun! We will be going to Jackson Hole Resort, January 21-28, 2023. Past Ski Weeks have been to Aspen Snowmass, Sun Valley, Big Sky, Banff, Breckenridge, Telluride, Whistler, Beaver Creek, and Keystone. We will be going to Steamboat, January 27 - February 3 in 2024.

We also offer a second ski trip in March which is immensely popular - the *Mini Trip*. This is a 5-day late spring trip. It doesn't include as many planned activities to keep the trip more affordable. Participants have flexibility to explore the area on their own or participate in group activities. This year, we will be going to *Taos*, *New Mexico*, and to Big White Ski Resort in 2024. Past trips have been to *Zermatt Utah Resort & Spa, Winter Park*, *Mt. Bachelor*, *Snowbasin*, *Whitefish*, *Crested Butte*, *Sun Peaks*, and *Alyeska*.

The North American Travel program plans adventure trips every two years that are non-ski trips. In June 2022, we toured Fairbanks & Denali National Park and took a cruise down the inland passage on the Majestic Princess. Past adventure trips have been a Windjammer Cruise aboard the Vela, exploring the fabulous British Virgin Islands, summer trips to Mammoth Lakes with fishing, kayaking, and bike riding; Panama Canal Cruise; Caribbean Cruise to the U.S. Virgin Islands, Bahamas, and St. Maarten; a Mississippi Steamboat Cruise and New Orleans trip; and a trip to see the start of the Iditarod in Anchorage, Alaska. FWSA Alaskan Adventure - 2022

Denali Tour & Alaska Inside Passage

June 21 - 25, 2022 - Denali Tour June 25 - July 2, 2022 - Alaska Inside Passage Cruise



There was so much excitement to do this trip. We started the trip with two days in Fairbanks, Alaska, followed by two days in Denali National Park, and then boarded the Majestic Princess in Whittier, Alaska for a week-long cruise through the inside passage. Due to a landslide that damaged the dock in Skagway, we stopped in Haines and ferried to Skagway to do the various excursions or sightsee at this port. We then cruised to Juneau and Ketchikan before disembarking in Vancouver, BC.

The Majestic Princess was built in 2017. It can hold 3,560 people and our ship had just under 2,000 people. This made for a comfortable cruising experience and safe traveling during COVID. Safety protocols were in place for mask wearing at inside venues, sanitation stations throughout the ship, and handwashing stations as you entered the Marketplace dining area. We had the option to eat inside or outside, and there were many open seating areas due to the reduced number of people on the ship.

We traveled by plane, train, bus, and cruise ship as we traveled across Alaska and enjoyed the diverse and beautiful landscape of this massive state. We saw reindeer, sled dogs, moose, bald eagles, whales, puffin, bears, seals, salmon, waterfalls, glaciers, rain forests, tundra, and more! We had some planned group tours, such as the Fairbanks Riverboat Cruise where we visited the late Susan Butcher's kennel and saw her champion sled dogs in action, visited a replica of an Athabascan Indian Village, and saw a bush float plane take off and land in the water. We took a Natural History Tour in Denali. There was so much to see and do, and our participants filled their days with horseback and bike riding, rode ATV's and an historic gold rush train, hiked, rafted, walked with reindeer, rode trams, took airplane and helicopter tours, watched an Alaskan lumberjack show, and more. 

2022 FWSA Ski Week to Soldën, Austria, with an **Extension Trip to the Black Forest in Germany**

On February 25, a group of 44 FWSA participants departed the U.S. for the FWSA International Ski Week in Soldën, Austria. We learned that it truly offered "The Big Three." There are three large ski areas to explore and Soldën is Austria's first resort offering three peaks beyond 10,000 feet. Soldën hosts the Alpine Ski World Cup and one of Europe's most renowned ski and snowboard resorts. The infinite number of slopes and ski trails are available for all levels, with over 91 miles of slopes, including two glaciers! This is the largest ski resort in the Ötztal Valley, and the Austrian hospitality is incomparable!

Our 4-Star Tyrolerhof Hotel was centrally located to the gondola/tram system, with many restaurants and cafes, and plentiful stores for shopping and nightlife activities. One could walk across the street and stroll along the beautiful river wandering its way down from the snowcapped mountains.

The Soldën/Ötztal Tourism Office Director, Mikaela, was available each evening to assist our participants by arranging special activities and tours for our non-skiers, as well as answer questions regarding the entire area...what an asset to our members! One highlight for our James Bond Fans was to visit the 007 Elements cinematic experience inside the summit of Gaislachkogl mountain!

While traveling during the strict COVID-19 protocols, we continued to practice safety protocols while indoors, in group settings and traveling on the bus. The ski resort personnel did monitor mask wearing in lift lines and waiting for a tram or gondola. We learned many things while complying with each country's requirements...it often changed. As soon as I provided our members one rule...it certainly was revised or eliminated. I kept telling everyone that, "The only thing that was Constant...is Change!"

From March 5 - 11, a smaller group of 22 participants enjoyed our extension trip while staying lakeside at the Hotel Maritim in beautiful Titisee-Neustadt, Germany. The Black Forest Region in Germany is like no other. The very name Black Forest invokes images of deep woodlands, traditional deeproofed farmhouses, cuckoo clocks, and halftimbered villages that look like they have been taken out of a fairy-tale book. And, you must not forget the infamous Black Forest cake. The rolling hills and awesome landscapes offered a never-ending series of photo worthy views.

The area is known for charming villages and unique cities full of beautiful trees. We had daily bus tours taking us to places such as: Lindau; Freiberg; Triberg; Colmar; Kayserberg; Heidelberg, including the Heidelberg Castle; and Strasbourg, including their historic cathedral. While in Triberg, we enjoyed hiking to the "Triberg Wasserfall" which is the largest waterfall in Germany, as well as, visiting many specialty shops proudly selling their signature cuckoo clocks, and touring their unique and interesting museum.

Another special activity included exploring Freiburg. One of the great masterpieces of the Gothic architecture in Germany is the Freiburg im Breisgau Munster. This impressive Gothic Church was built between the 13th and 16th century where the 116-meterhigh tower sweeps the views of the rooftops of the entire old town.

We experienced many delightful restaurants, enchanting hamlets, and communities while appreciating perfect weather.






2022 Croatia Adventure Trip was a Huge Success

If you've been on one of our adventure trips, you know how fun they are. After a two-year delay due to COVID, we finally were able to go on our trip to Croatia, originally planned for 2020. Far West Ski Association partnered with Alpine Adventures for this Balkan country adventure trip. Croatia is known for its 3,625-mile-long Adriatic coastline with over 1,000 islands. Our 36 participants left the US on September 1 for our trip held from September 2-12. Our excellent itinerary included the most popular sites in Croatia: Zagreb, Split, Plitvice National Park, Dubrovnik, and the beautiful Croatian islands along the Dalmatian Coast.

Split, as the second largest city and located on the coast of the Adriatic Sea, offered an attractive blend of modern and ancient charm.

We loved our nights on the luxury 5-star MS President yacht. We had this sleek, modern cruiser all to ourselves. We stayed in wellappointed en suite cabins and enjoyed the large inside restaurant and bar, as well as the outdoor terrace, huge sun deck and plunge pool. We had time for swimming, snorkeling and relaxing. The highlight was exploring the stunning Croatian islands and Dalmatian coast. We had guided tours on the islands of Hvar, Korcula and Brac. We enjoyed wine tasting on Hvar, olive oil tasting on Brac, and a traditional peka meal on the island of Vis, farthest from the mainland. What a fine gastronomical experience.

Our last stop in Croatia was the stunningly picturesque city of Dubrovnik, known as the "Pearl of the Adriatic" for good reason. It is known for its culture, art and architecture, especially its popular 16th century stone-walled Old Town, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Dubrovnik was the filming location for The Game of Thrones. Join us on an upcoming trip to see and experience magnificent parts of the world.

2022 Dive Trip to Cozumel, Mexico

The FWSA's 11th Annual Dive Trip in 2022 to Cozumel, Mexico was excellent! If you've joined us for a dive trip, you know how great they are. Far West Ski Association collaborated, once again, with the specialists at Roatan Charter Inc. for our fantastic dive and vacation adventure to the Iberostar Resort in Cozumel October 8-15, 2022. The 5-star all-inclusive Iberostar Resort located right on the beach within the Marine Park offered us three pools, including two lagoon-style pools plus a variety of entertainment. We appreciated the resort's shopping area, spa, and pool hall. Every night there was something happening, from theatrical performances to live music. We also had our choice of tennis, nonmotorized water sports, archery, rifle shooting, beach volleyball, table tennis, basketball, water aerobics and gym. We enjoyed all of this plus dining at the specialty restaurants.

The real reason for the trip was the scuba diving. The Palancar and Santa Rosa Wall reefs surround the hotel and is a protective area within the marine park. This impressive reef is part of the Great Barrier Reef of the Western Atlantic, also known as the Great Mayan Reef, a diving area second only to the Great Barrier Reef. We were very pleased with the dive package that included five 2-tank dives, 2 Cenotes dives, one night dive and complimentary nitrox. Their Dive Shop, a PADI CDC Center in business for 25 years, has an unstained historic safety record with a 0% accident rate. Dressel Divers imparts training programs to its staff that directly result in higher safety for its guests. We liked their convenient dive center right on the resort property, along with equipment storage and a drying room.

FWSA Chile Ski & Adventure Trip

Postponed from 2023 to Summer 2025

For years, many of you, our Far West skiers, have asked us to offer a South American Ski Trip. Good news: we have plans to do just that. We will be working on a trip during the summer of 2025. This will be a Ski and Adventure Trip to Valle Nevado, Chile, with additional skiing available at La Parva and El Colorado. If you haven't skied in South America yet, this is your opportunity.

Valle Nevado is South America's premier ski resort, offering access to over 7000 acres of terrain and has the most modern lift operation on the continent. They are proud of their laid-back environment with no lift lines, inviting ambience and delicious gourmet food. The awe-inspiring peak of El Pomo towers above the twin valleys in which the three best ski areas of South America are located. Far West participants will be flying into Santiago, then travel 90 minutes to the ski area of the world-famous Andes Mountains. This area provides amazing views, varied terrain, and an incredible experience during our summer, which is their winter. This trip will be limited, so it will be important that you sign up quickly once registration materials are available.

After Valle Nevado, we will be traveling to the Atacama Desert, a desert plateau covering a total area of 40,541 square miles stretching 600 miles from southern Peru into northern Chile, west of the Andes mountain range. Because the Atacama Desert sits at 6,000 feet, it offers exceptional skies and 330 clear nights each year resulting in worldwide recognition for its focus on astronomy. The Atacama Desert is the driest place in the world and the only true desert to receive less precipitation than the polar deserts. Most of the desert is composed of stony terrain, salt lakes, sand, and felsic lava that flows towards the Andes. Some parts of the Atacama Desert are similar to the surface of Mars.

According to *The New York Times*, the Atacama Desert is the #2 place to visit. To get there, we will take a 2-hour plane ride from Santiago to Calama, which is known for the largest open pit copper mine in the world. We will have the opportunity for hiking, biking, and adventuring out to see unique environmental landscapes. There are sand dunes, salt flats, lagoons inhabited with flamingos, areas with geysers, unique flora and fauna, various animals and so much more!

FWSA 2026 Ski Week - Chamonix, France

Chamonix is another top-rated world class ski resort. The last time we had a Ski Week there was in 2012. Do you remember skiing the famous Vallée Blanche? It's an off-piste ski route, 12+ miles long with a vertical descent of 8,800 feet, usually skied with a guide. The views are stunning and the high mountain environment provides a real sensation of wilderness. If you haven't skied that yet, you may want to do so on our upcoming trip. This is one of those memorable life experiences that you'll never forget. If that kind of skiing is not your preference, that's fine. Chamonix combines 5 ski resorts providing skiing for all levels including plenty of intermediate and beginning terrain.

12th Annual FWSA Scuba Dive Trip to be Held in September, 2023

The FWSA's 12th Annual Scuba Dive Trip will be to the fabulous Turks & Caicos Islands, with Roatan Charter.

The Turks and Caicos is a British Overseas Territory, considered a part of the Caribbean region. With more than 40 small islands and cays, the eight inhabited islands are separated into two island groups; to the east of the Turks Island Passage are the Turks Islands and to the west are the Caicos Islands. The islands are located 575 miles southeast of Miami, Florida, south of the Bahamas and east of Cuba.

The trip includes seven nights at East Bay Resort in South Caicos (double occupancy with all meals daily) and resort amenities. Perched on the most stunning beach in South Caicos, all rooms at East Bay Resort feature breathtaking views of their expansive, private 1.5 mile long beach. East Bay Resort has all the amenities for a great worry-free vacation: private entrances, private balconies, fully-equipped kitchens, AC and free Wi-Fi.

Reef Divers has a team of PADI and SSI certified dive professionals, and is dedicated to ensuring the safety of divers and protecting the environment, while providing memorable div-

ing adventures and exclusive valet diving services. Divers will have great opportunity to see large marine life year-round including several species of sharks, turtles, rays, eels and large schools of jacks, in addition to other diverse reef creatures and fish.

The snowsports industry leadership organizations came with a total of 61 million skier visits. This represents an intogether, and outlined changes to their operations to comply with government mandates due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We outlined the changes that were being made in travel, lifts, lodging and dining, and what to expect if planning a European ski reation, were two of the primary contributing factors to the seavacation.

In the 34th Edition, we featured a follow-up article entitled, "A New Normal (Part II) What to Expect for the 2021-2022 Ski Season..." The strategies of the snowsports industry leadership organizations and ski resorts were quite successful for the 2020-2021 season in changing operations to adhere to COVID-19 mandates, and resulted in more than 59 million skier visits. In the Kottke End of Season and Demographic Report 2020-2021 published by the National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) it was determined that a noticeable amount of lapsed skiers and snowboarders were participating again. (www.nsaa.org) Ac-19 on Snowsports Consumers" report showed that a large percentage of winter enthusiasts not only engaged in new winter sports during the season, but participated more times than in the previous season. (https://snowsports.org)

What kind of participation did we have this past season as crease of 3.5% over the last season's national number. In the wake of the pandemic, skiing and snowboarding rebounded. A strong season pass sales and a continued desire for outdoor recson's record-breaking results.

This bodes well for the long-term health of the sport, since participant numbers had been relatively flat over the past decade. It means the U.S. ski industry is healthy and outdoor recreation remains strong. For the past two years, the pandemic led more people to seek outdoor activities. Historically, changes in skier visits could be correlated with snowfall, with more snow generally meaning more skiers. However, last season the average snowfall was 145" nationally, lower than the 10-year average of 166".

Despite the pandemic, resorts had forged ahead with capcording to Ski Industries America (SIA) "The Impacts of COVID- ital investments to improve the skiing and boarding experience. This trend has not only continued, but has been strengthened. NSAA reported that the capital investment by ski areas is projected to reach an all-time high, totaling \$728 million for the upcoming capital season.

However, it wasn't all good news for winter sports participants last season. The ski industry struggled, as with many industries, to attract and retain staff for the season. Over 80% of resorts told NSAA that they were not fully staffed. Ski areas responded by raising wages, adding end-of-season bonuses, and investing in affordable workforce housing. Due to short staffing, resorts faced complaints about closed lifts, limited terrain, and long lift lines, plus other issues created by not enough available workers.

A Look at Summer Skiing

There was good news this summer for skiing in South America, as pandemic restrictions began to relax. It was the first time in three years that skiers from around the world could head back to the Andes. There were some restrictions still in place, but it was possible to travel if you met the criteria required by government mandates. Mainly, it was having adequate medical insurance to cover getting back to where you came from. Portillo in Chile opened a week early due to big snowfalls, and had only been open for a few weeks at the end of their last winter season, by the time the country eased restrictions. Conditions were good in the rest of the areas, with most opening on schedule in June. Las Lenas in Argentina also opened, and had not been in operation since 2019.

Canada's Blackcomb Glacier above Whistler also opened, for the first time since 2019. New Zealand's pre-departure testing was rescinded on June 21, just in time for the peak July ski season. It opened its border to Australians, with quarantine-free travel resuming between the two countries on April 13. However, despite restrictions being eased in many leading nations, Air Charter Service noted that 76% of countries still had some form of travel restrictions in place in June. The USA no longer required a negative coronavirus COVID-19 result for arrivals, so skiers headed to the southern hemisphere or Europe's glaciers would no longer need to take a pre-departure test before flying there. What are some of the lasting changes to be expected in the winter travel industry as we enter season 2022-2023, as a result of the pandemic?

Comprehensive Insurance

Safety concerns are always primary when skiing or snow-boarding, as it is part of the sport. There is always a danger of getting injured on the slopes. However, COVID-19 added a new unpredictability when planning for a ski trip.

Season Pass sales surged in popularity due to the pandemic. Last season, for the third season in a row, season passes surpassed day tickets in the share of skier visits. Season pass holders made up 51.9% of visits nationally, with day tickets at 37.3% (with the balance by off-duty employees, complimentary tickets, etc).

Skiing was an outdoor experience available, and the season pass assured skiing availability when there was no guarantee that a day pass would be available, due to crowd awareness. Locals flocked to nearby mountains when travel elsewhere was limited.

When COVID-19 hit in mid-March 2020, the Ikon Pass and

Epic Season Pass purchases were not refunded due to the unexpected closures. Alterra, which operates the Ikon Pass, did extend the deadline for early renewals and the payment plan deadline. Epic announced it would offer season pass holders credits of up to 80 percent to apply to a 2020-2021 pass, based on how much they had used their pass.

Alterra then announced Adventure Assurance, which initially gave 2020-2021 Ikon Pass holders the choice to defer for credit toward the 2021-2022 season for any reason with no fee. Adventure Assurance now comes free with every 2022-2023 Ikon Pass, giving pass holders credits in the case of COVID-related closures.

Starting in 2020-2021, Epic Passes included Epic Coverage with every pass, which would provide refunds associated with personal events and certain resort closures, which included closure due to COVID-19. (www.forbes.com)

Ski Trip Insurance

If you have never purchased ski trip insurance, it is something you might consider doing, and conduct some research on the policies available. The insurance market now offers policies that cover COVID-19 situations. Cancellation benefits for travelers who contract the disease, or are quarantined prior to their trip, are provided for in most standard travel insurance policies now. Medical and Medical Evacuation benefits are also available for travelers who contract COVID-19 while traveling. There are also upgrades available for policies for travelers who want to cancel for any other reason related to COVID-19 (a Cancel for Any Reason Upgrade). (www.squaremouth.com)

Easier Cancellation Policies

Many ski resorts have adjusted into easier cancellation policies, because of the changing local, state/province and national restrictions due to the pandemic. For example, Winter Park Resort now offers a "Carefree Cancellations" policy. The resort stated it understands travel plans may need to change, so they are proud to offer their guests Carefree Cancellation with every booking. Condominium and hotel reservations for Winter Park Resort Lodging, winter arrivals, can be cancelled for a full refund up to three weeks prior to arrival. In addition, all lift tickets, activities, lessons, and rentals can be cancelled for a full refund up to one week prior to your arrival. (www.winterparkresort.com)

Booking a Trip

When booking a trip through a group or a tour operator, we trust that they have done their due diligence, and have provided the best rate possible, and are aware of any health related travel restrictions that you might face in your travels.

It is interesting to note that customers are not only focused on health and safety protocols, but also have a greater expecta-

tion for the type of customer service that they experienced during the pandemic. Hotels and other businesses in the travel industry were desperate for travelers, and the customer experience was enhanced to a level that customers now expect to be continued. (www.styleattitudes.com)

Length of Trips

The length of trips has also had a shift. There has been a growing popularity of "grab-it-while-you-can" vacations, which means more short term trips taken during the year without long term planning. No one wants to wait for a year for a holiday that could be cancelled due to a pandemic, a strike by baggage handlers, or other workers on which your holiday depends.

Many skiers and boarders are taking shorter trips, and this trend has been also fueled by fewer days spent in the office and the ability to E-Work from wherever you are, even if it is in the mountains. It is more convenient, because if there is a last minute glitch, you can simply abort the trip and go another time. (www.styleattitudes.com)

Backcountry Popularity Grows

Global Rescue reported that with the ski mountains closed, as in the beginning of the pandemic, or filled up due to COVID-19 restrictions as it continued, enterprising skiers found other ways to get outside and enjoy the season. Heli-skiing, heliboarding, backcountry skiing, splitboarding and snowshoeing all had increased activity.

Heli-skiing (and heli-boarding) is off-trail, downhill skiing (or snowboarding) reached by helicopter. With backcountry skiing you are skiing in the wilderness - there's no lodge, no lift and no ski patrol. Snowboarders can also explore the backcountry using a splitboard: a normal snowboard that splits into two halves, two mini skis, so snowboarders can climb up hills and then attach the halves back together at the top.

When ski resorts shut down in March 2020, a record number of customers bought new gear at retail stores, crowded trailheads and then inadvertently triggered avalanches on the backcountry slopes.

At a resort, ski patrol and first aid services are on site. In the backcountry, facilities and ranger stations may be closed due to COVID-19. This has made safety all the more important for the backcountry sportsman, due to avalanches, injury, fragile glaciers, extreme coldness, altitude sickness and less help if necessary.

If this trend continues into the upcoming season, which it is expected to do, participants are strongly encouraged to do their research to read what the experts have to say, because the experts give very sound advice - that could save your life and the lives of others. Visit www.globalrescue.com for detailed information.

Technological Advances

The winter sports industry had to place technology as a top priority, in order to adhere to government mandates required, and keep their business operational. Ski areas are becoming much more efficient in what they do, out of necessity. Reservations systems had to be upgraded to be user friendly, since advanced reservations were necessary to limit crowds. Reservations were required, because walk up day passes might not be available.

A touchless interaction with guests was required, from hotel check-in, to purchases of rentals, lessons or food, to getting on the lifts. Some resorts have a print your own lift ticket system or a lift ticket that is reloadable for the next time you go skiing. Moving skiers and boarders up the hill faster to prevent crowds gathering at the base of a lift, accelerated demand for increased lift capacity per chair, and speed of transit.

Apps were improved, so you could make reservations to dine on or off the mountain through your watch, or phone, from anywhere. You can link into programs where you can get terrain maps or weather conditions on and off the mountain, plus a whole menu choice of other information to make your day in the mountains run efficiently and smoothly.

Jackson Hole Mountain Resort's app upgrades are representative of the type that ski areas made this year in order to address various operational challenges caused by the pandemic. "The JH Insider app's parking availability function was enhanced to counter an increase in the portion of visitors driving to the mountain this year versus using public transportation," chief brand officer Tyler LaMotte said. Tram wait time information was also added to the app, with the mountain having to limit the capacity of its aerial tram to 25% of normal.

Rusty Gregory, CEO of Alterra Mountain Company, said the innovations from this past year won't be the last changes skiers will see, either. Rather, they set the stage for even more developments going forward. "I think you'll see a tremendous amount of

experimentation with the innovation and application of technology to the guest experience next year," Gregory said. (www.travel-weeklu.com)


Great News for International Travel

Currently, the United States is one of a few countries that still has a vaccination restriction for foreign nationals who wish to enter the United States. If you are a non-U.S. citizen who is a nonimmigrant (not a U.S. citizen, U.S. national, lawful permanent resident, or traveling to the United States on an immigrant visa), you will need to show proof of being fully vaccinated against COVID-19 before you can travel by air to the United States from a foreign country. Some categories of noncitizen, nonimmigrants are excepted from this requirement, but if you meet the criteria for one of these categories, you will need to fulfill additional requirements. This vaccination restriction does not apply to U.S. citizens, U.S. nationals, or U.S. lawful permanent residents (Green Card holders).

As of March 1, 2022, EU countries began to allow non-essential travel for persons vaccinated with vaccines approved by the EU or by the World Health Organization, and for persons who recovered from COVID-19. By summer, many European countries had removed travel restrictions relating to the disease, and now almost all of Europe is open to tourist travel without restriction.

October brought exciting news for snowsports enthusiasts who want to travel to Canada; news that we were waiting for all summer! As of October 1, 2022, for all travelers entering

Japan also lifted a major restriction in October, welcoming tourists back. As of October 11, 2022, tourists with U.S. Passports no longer needed a visa to stay up to three months. However, tourists must either have at least three coronavirus shot applications or a pre-arrival test with a negative result. The U.S. embassy strongly urges any U.S. citizens considering travel to Japan to carefully review the information available from the Government of Japan, available on their website, because details (including vaccination requirements) and additional information will be updated on their website when available.

The Far West Ski Association Athletic Scholarship Program is in its 18th year, growing from an initial \$1,500 in scholarships in 2004 to \$7,650 and 14 recipients in the 2021-2022 season. The total awarded since the program's inception is over \$170,000 to 126 recipients. The program is designed to provide financial assistance to junior ski racers throughout the western United States where FWSA has a presence. Applicants must be junior alpine ski racers affiliated with the United States Ski and Snowboard Association (USSS) and must participate in racing programs in states where FWSA has regional councils. These include California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Arizona, Idaho, Utah, and Wyoming. Scholarships are awarded based on financial need, athletic performance, academic achievement, and community serv-

Skiing is an expensive sport and the costs involved in ski racing cannot be left up to the parents alone to incur. For younger athletes the costs are modest. However, for 16 through 20 year olds, where competition becomes na-

tional and even international, the costs can be significant. Without the help of outside resources, many junior racers simply cannot compete. For a top competitor, expenses can reach \$20,000 per year. This is not a seasonal sport for these racers; it includes a full year of ski-related involvement. After the winter race competition has concluded, competitors engage in dryland training; then off to summer camps. Camps typically run about \$1,200 per week, not including transportation.

Winter training costs range from \$1,000-\$1,500 each season. Most applicants work part time to offset expenses. The demands on their time are significant. They must balance their time between training, competition, school, work, and community service. Despite these demands, the average GPA for these recipients consistently exceeds a 3.9 average. Our scholarships are modest compared to the need, but they do make a difference in the overall scope of the resources they require.

The funding of the scholarships come from a number of sources: raffles, auctions, club and council partnerships, and direct contributions from club members, clubs, and councils. The FWSA has greatly benefitted from the generous support from its sponsors including: Whitefish Mountain Resort (www.skiwhitefish.com), a year round winter and summer resort; Kandahar Lodge, and Grouse Mountain Lodge in Whitefish, Montana; Schure Sports, Inc., maker of the Karbon line of snowsports apparel; the US Ski Team, and the Far West Racing Association. Their contributions of vacation packages, snowsports apparel, and cash bring in approximately \$10,000 per year as raffle and auction proceeds, as well as, direct cash donations.

In addition, our partnership program through clubs and councils afford us approximately one third of our scholarship funding each year. Finally, the *Far West Ski Foundation* (www.farwestskifoundation.org), a 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization, is a valuable resource for encouraging tax exempt donations.

Far West Ski Foundation New Initiatives

The Far West Ski Foundation (FWSF) is a non-profit organization that has four snowsports missions: **Building for the Future**, **Rehabilitation and Renewal, Sustaining Snowsports**, and **Preserving the Legacy**. The FWSF is currently staffed by volunteers.

The Foundation may receive tax deductible contributions in furtherance of its missions and objectives. Such funds are then directed to the focused missions of the Foundation. FWSF is an autonomous, public benefit non-profit corporation operating under the laws of the State of California and in compliance with law and regulations under section 501(c)(3) of the IRS code.

The FWSF Wine and See's Candy Auction at the FWSA's Annual Convention in June raised close to \$1,000 and is earmarked for adaptive sports. sion and is scheduled to be completed in the fall. It will be structured to enhance our new initiative to procure grants. We also recently produced a brochure, which will be available on our website at www.farwestskifoundation.org.

FWSA History Program

There are a number of reasons why we have a history program. First, to expose or educate members to the dynamic history of their sport. Second, to provide educational material for public use. Third, to promote the establishment, growth, and continuance of preservation in learning centers and museums. Fourth, to provide opportunities for research into snowsport history. The foundations of this program began in the early 2000's under the leadership of then president, Mike Sanford.

We started with the *Ski Club/Council History Recognition* patterned after the Outstanding Ski Club competition. We laid out a detailed template for guidance on what could be in such a history. The competing entries would be judged by an expert panel. Criteria include support activity in the public community. Such histories show the pace of the Association's development (within the larger universe of snowsports industry development), inform members – and conceivably be patched together into a broader history. It can be used for outreach and recruiting. Con-

gratulations to this year's winner for the Club & Council History competition to *Après Ski* & *Social Club* of the *Bay Area Snow Sports Council*.

The amount of work that must go into a substantial history discouraged participation and caused us to create a recognition other than the original. So, we started the Historic Ski Club (HSC) program for clubs who could prove operation for 50 years or more. Note that this now means formation before and operation since 1973. Just provide the History Chair an application available on www.fwsa. org, your proof of founding date and a good hi-res color logo. The **HSC** program proves the enduring attraction of clubs and the need for them to provide a basic information center at the grassroots. We welcomed three additions to the HSC alumni this year at the FWSA Convention in Portland. Congratulations to All Seasons Ski Club of the NBS Western Region Council, Après Ski & Social Club and Rusty Bindings Singles Ski Club, both members of Bay Area Snow Sports Council.

The *HSC* programs also include Ski Patrols and Ski Schools within the Far West region. If you know of a deserving Ski School; or Patrol that has been in existence for 50 or more years, please, as above, contact the FWSA History Chair with a completed application available on *www.fwsa.org*, along with proof of founding date and a good hi-res color logo.

The **Western Ski Heritage Award** is sponsored by Steamboat. Western Ski Heritage is an odyssey. It was designed to recognize recent work which shows the role of snowsport in the larger community. We have recognized many authors and research projects, all shown on **www.fwsa.org**. This year, the WSH was awarded to **Lowell Skoog**, author of "Written in the Snows: Across Time on Skis in the Pacific Northwest."

We still have work to be done in the preservation of Association records and the trends that could be gained from them. If you read through previous issues of the Far West Skier's Guide, The Councilman and/or The Far West Ski Association Turns 90 booklet, you will see several possible historic sketches that need authors. Using the Secretary's minutes and reports from councils and committee chairmen, an annual narrative could be written. All good for recruiting. Any volunteers out there that enjoy research and writing? Get in touch with us and let's start planning. Congratulations to our winners!

Take a moment and reflect, and think about the future of snowsports, and how you could contribute to its sustainability. What would be your area of interest - youth programs, junior racing scholarships, adaptive and rehabilitative programs, ski heritage, or diversity on the slopes?

Following are a few snowsports foundations that are 501(c)(3) non-profit corporations, and have specific missions dedicated to sustaining snowsports. All have well organized programs, and depend on individual donations, partnerships, community support, and grants to fund them. There are also other very worthy foundations, that are not mentioned here. Donations to these foundations are tax deductible per government regulations.

Far West Ski Foundation

The Far West Ski Foundation (FWSF) was founded in 1964, aimed exclusively at preparing ski racers from California and Nevada for the 1968 Olympics and further international competition. In 2009, the scope of the FWSF was expanded with approval by the IRS, followed by the California Secretary of State in 2010. Proceeds from Foundation fundraising are directed to one of several mission areas. The FWSF has four missions:

Building for the Future, Rehabilitation and Renewal, Sustaining Snowsports, and Preserving the Legacy. It is still staffed by volunteers, with a collective several centuries of volunteer experience in: club, council, regional and national leadership; racing, both recreational as well as sanctioned; National Ski Patrol (NSP), and the United States Adaptive Recreation Center (USARC).

Their Key Programs include: Athletic Scholarship Program - Now

in its 18th year, the total of scholarships awarded since the program's inception is over \$184,000 to 131 different recipients. The program provides financial assistance to junior ski racers throughout the western United States where the Far West Ski Association, its partner organization, has a presence, currently 12 western states. Applicants must be junior alpine ski racers affiliated with the United States Ski and Snowboard (USSA). Scholarships are awarded based on financial need,

athletic performance, academic achievement, and community service.

Adaptive Programs - The FWSF supports adaptive snowsports programs as a way to enhance restoration to vigor from injury or to animate the physically challenged. It maintains relationships with centers within its territory that practice on-snow rehabilitative techniques. Of special interest are the programs that involve active duty service persons or veterans. The Foundation has granted funds to a variety of adaptive programs, including the Vail Veterans Program, Snowbasin Adaptive Sports Education, Dream Adaptive Recreation, Oregon Adaptive Sports, Adaptive Sports Center, Mammoth Adaptive Sports, Sun Peaks Adaptive Sports, Challenge Alaska Adaptive Ski School, Jimmie Heuga Center (Can Do MS), High Fives Foundation, Big White Ski & Board School, Disabled Sports Eastern Sierra, and Challenge Aspen.

Women's Ski Jumping - A movement for the recognition of Women's Ski Jumping started early in the Far West region in Park City, Utah. Far West Ski Foundation, in collaboration with the Far West Ski Association, has supported Women's Ski Jumping USA (WSJUSA) since 2009, with special campaigns within organized skiing. Deedee Corradini, the former Mayor of Salt Lake City and the first woman President of Women's Ski Jumping, was the outspoken and unvielding leader in the global fight to allow women to participate in ski jumping at the Olympic level. That dream was realized at the 2014 Olympic Winter Games in Sochi. Deedee was honored by Far West Ski Association as the 2009 Snowsports Builder. The Foundation has resolved to make scholarship grants to the Fly Girls program in honor of Deedee Corradini.

Preserving the Legacy - From the discovery of skis in the Altai of China as early as 8000BC, as a toll for transportation through the succeeding millennia and across seven continents, to today's use of skis and snowboards for sport, activities we now label as snowsports have played a significant role, not just within sport itself but in societies at large. Throughout this enduring history, snowsports has played an historic role in the development of communities, the exposure to healthful outdoor exercise, increase of fitness in winter, and the thrill of competition, whether as a competitor or as an observer. Bringing the elements of this legacy to the world is a task in which the Foundation aims to play a part. The Foundation supports preservation of the legacy through research, publications, educational media and support to museums and cultural centers for display and secure storage of memorabilia. The Foundation has approved grants to the Squaw Valley Ski Museum Foundation (SNOW Sports Museum) and the California Ski Library.

National Winter Sports Education Foundation Winter4Kids

National Winter Activity Center is located in Vernon, New Jersey. The Far West Ski Association presented Schone Malliet, CEO and Founder, with the Snowsports Builder Award at its 88th Annual Convention in October, 2021. The Snowsports Builder Award is given to an individual who has made an indelible positive impact on snowsports. His goal is to "make a POSITIVE difference in the lives of others."

The Winter4Kids program was developed out of an initiative of the National Winter Sports Education Foundation, whose mission is to improve the lives, health and fitness of youth through winter activities. The organization has the collaboration of several nationally recognized partner organizations.

The Center introduces children to activities that they would not typically be exposed to or consider trying, while making it economically feasible. The program includes wholesome meals, fitted gear and six weeks of lessons, typically held on weekends. The mission of Winter4Kids is to create healthy lifestyles and influence behaviors of youth through winter activities. Winter sports and the outdoors serves as a catalyst to create, influence and promote healthy lifestyles. It instills positive attitudes, changes outlooks and lives among the most underserved communities, primarily those of color. The Center served 180 children in its first year of operation, and in 2018, more than 1,400 kids came through the program. The projection is to serve 10,000 children by the end of the year.

Through this program, better health and attitudes result from an increased moderate to vigorous activity, nutritious food, and personal development. Outlooks are bright and lives are changed as participants become better individuals through the mastery of snow and life skills. The youth involved in the program use these experiences to explore and pursue new academic, life and sport opportunities.

The **SNOW** Sports Museum (dba Squaw Valley Ski Museum Foundation) has as its missions and objectives to build a world class museum to offer cultural, historical and educational opportunities for people of all ages and abilities, especially youth. All purchases and donations support these efforts. It seeks to preserve the winter sports and Olympic history of the Sierra Nevada Region, to share stories of the legends of winter, and to inspire generations to experience the wonder and passion of their unique mountain spirit.

The idea to build a museum of Sierra Ski History and the 1960 Winter Olympic Games has been in the hearts and minds of the skiing community for many decades. The Squaw Valley Ski Museum Foundation was established by members of the Tahoe Truckee community to make this dream a reality, and they began to look for a site where the stories and events of over 100 years of ski history could be displayed in a modern facility.

At the conclusion of a week-long Olympic Heritage Celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the 1960 Winter Olympics held in 2010, the success of an unforgettable, sold-out Gala at the Resort at Squaw Creek in Squaw Valley was seen as proof of overwhelming interest and support. Event Center – A Community Hub and Event Center offering a unique space where visitors, locals and students can gather to experience films, conferences, presentations and lectures in a mountain-modern, technologically advanced building.

Olympic Medalists Steve and Phil Mahre were the Keynote Speakers at the 89th Annual Far West Ski Association Convention. Their outstanding presentation was enjoyed by all in attendance. There was laughter in the stories, and so much appreciation shown by both US Ski Team Racers for all the help they had along the way contributing to their success.

Once-In-A-Lifetime Keynote Speaker Experience

For those that were able to attend the FWSA 2022 Convention at the Holiday Inn Columbia Riverfront Hotel in Portland, you got to experience an amazing keynote presentation by Olympic medalists Phil and Steve Mahre.

Phil Mahre is a former World Cup alpine ski racer, widely regarded as one of the greatest American skiers of all time. His total of 27 World Cup race wins is fourth among Americans, only behind Lindsey Vonn, Mikaela Shiffrin, and Bode Miller. Phil won the 1980 Olympic Silver medal in Slalom at Lake Placid and the 1984 Olympic Gold medal in slalom at Sarajevo.

Born in Yakima, Washington, Phil and his twin brother Steve (four minutes younger) were both world class ski racers and competed on the World Cup circuit from 1976 to 1984. Starting with the 1978 season, Phil finished in the top three in the World Cup overall standings for six consecutive seasons, winning the title in the final three (1981, 1982, and 1983).

Steve won the United States Ski Association National Slalom titles in 1975, 1980,

1981 and 1984 and the U.S.S.A. National Giant Slalom title in 1984. Both twins were members of the U.S. Ski Team from 1975 through 1985 and skied for the United States on three Olympic Teams: the 1976 Olympics at Innsbruck, Austria, the 1980 Olympics in Lake Placid, New York and the 1984 Olympics in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia. At the Sarjevo Olympics, Steve won the silver medal in the slalom, finishing just behind his brother Phil.

After nine seasons, the Mahre twins retired from the World Cup circuit following the 1984 season. Steve finished his career with 9 World Cup victories and 21 podiums. Their presentation was informative, humorous, retrospective, emotional, and raw. Gratitude was the overwhelming emotion from both of them.

When Phil won his Olympic Silver medal at the 1980 Olympics in Lake Placid, Steve had a ticket for the U.S. vs. Russia hockey game that night. The game should have been over long before the medal ceremony, however, the game went into overtime and Steve missed Phil's medal ceremony. As

Steve said "all America remembers from 1980 was the Miracle on Ice hockey game beating the Russians and I couldn't miss the finish."

During one World Cup race, their coaches got their bibs mixed up and Steve wore Phil's bib and Phil wore Steve's bib. Not knowing of the mistake until Steve had a great second run winning the race and they announced Phil as the winner. Well, after telling the jury of their mistake, they were disqualified. After the award ceremony, Marc Girardelli, walked over to Steve, handed him the Gold Medal and said "this is yours, you beat me".

At the 1984 Winter Olympics in Sarajevo, Phil again medaled in the slalom, this time taking the gold while Steve won the silver for a Mahre twin 1-2 sweep. Steve had led the first run, skiing flawlessly and building a large half-second lead over the Swede, Jonas Nilsson, with Phil in third place, another twotenths of a second back. Phil skied a great second run to grab the lead, then Nilsson skied next and faltered, dropping out of the medals. Steve skied down last, needing only a solid run to take the gold, but a series of mistakes dropped him into second place, and Phil became the Olympic champion. Unknown to the racers, Phil's wife Holly had given birth to their second child, a son, in Arizona an hour before the race started. Phil did not find out about it until a TV interview after the race. Phil's memory from that day is the birth of his son!

They both stated how lucky they are, building a life out of the sport they both loved. They also stated how, so many people that they didn't even know, stepped up to help fund their ski racing efforts and their dreams when their parents ran out of money. I can't put into words the raw emotion and gratitude that they expressed in talking about this and how the FWSA Athletic Scholarship Program will help fund the Olympic champions of tomorrow keeping the dreams of up-and-coming racers alive.

They are using their fame and Olympic Medals to raise money for charities. They both had their Olympic medals put into a display that is auctioned off for a charity approximately every six months where the winner gets to display the medals for a stated period.

Many convention attendees had their pictures taken with Phil and Steve and FWSA is making those pictures available with a donation to the Far West Ski Foundation to support the Athletic Scholarship Program.

Phil and Steve Mahre are true champions and great role models.

The programs created by Far West Ski Association to honor its volunteers have been many and varied. Educational Opportunities at Convention Snowsports Leadership Academy Sessions

Three Snowsports Leadership Academy sessions were presented at the Annual Convention this year. The modules provided education on specific topics of interest to ski club officers and members. The purpose of the Academy is to provide an informational forum to the members attending the FWSA Convention, and has evolved into a valuable resource. It is designed to provide Far West members training and tools to enhance and expand their club programs, and be recognized industry wide as having a measure of standards and consistency.





"Strategic Travel - in a Changing World" was moderated by *Debbie Stewart* with presenters: Sandy Gaudette - SkiGroup.net, Maxine Jensen - Alpine Adventures, Sean McErlean - Holidaze Ski Tours; and Gloria Saiya-Woods - Ski.Com.

These highly knowledgeable industry partners addressed the latest up-to-date information needed for club trip directors that are facing an ever-changing world of travel. Discussion included some of the "most asked questions" regarding international and domestic rules and regulations, protocols, lodging issues, transportation challenges, pandemic and COVID mandates, insurance and much more.

"Avalanche Safety and Mountain Rescue" was presented by Steve Rollins and Paige Baugher, Ph.D, EMR, WFR, Rescue Leaders from Portland Mountain Rescue (PMR).

Paige is also a PMR Public Information Officer, a Professional Observer and Avalanche Awareness Instructor, Northwest Avalanche Center and an Avalanche Educator, Outdoor Pursuits, Pacific University of Oregon. Portland Mountain Rescue is a non-profit mountain rescue team that conducts Search and Rescue (SAR) missions for lost or out-of-bound skiers and snowboarders, rescues fallen climbers, and provides other search and rescue services at the request of law enforcement. This team specializes in high mountain, all-weather rescues including avalanche, crevasse rescue, zero visibility navigation, technical rope rescue, and helicopter operations. In addition to providing a review of rescue operations, they provided valuable insight into how not to get into a situation that requires a rescue. They also extended their appreciation to all FWSA members who have been or are currently volunteer members of the National Ski Patrol, for the work they do the mountain.

"How to Jumpstart Your Facebook Social Media Presence" was presented by Marc Galt - Founder of Ski the Northwest and Todd Hood - Treasurer, National Brotherhood of Skiers - Western Region.

The workshop shared actionable steps so users can utilize standard free Facebook tools to grow their social media audience immediately, and provided a lot of opportunity for questions and audience interaction. Public Affairs Panelists Address Snowsports Issues

Two Public Affairs sessions were conducted on Saturday, June 11, at the 2022 Far West Ski Association Convention held in Portland, Oregon.

The morning session had a very knowledgeable group of panelists that addressed current snowsports issues, and in particular, climate related challenges impacting not only western resorts, but resorts throughout the US. Valuable insight was provided into how leading ski organizations were creating programs to address these challenges. Panelists included: Matt Zaffino, KGW -TV Chief Meteorologist; Dave Tragethon, Vice President of Marketing, Sales & Communications, Mt. Hood Meadows; and Iordan Elliott, President of the Northwest Ski Areas Association.

The afternoon session featured Keynote Speaker Phil Mahre 1984 Olympic Gold Medalist, with a surprise visit from his twin brother Steve Mahre, 1984 Olympic Silver Medalist, who entertained us with their wisdom and knowledge of skiing and racing. Also included on the panel was Trux Dole, President of the 10th Mountain Division Foundation, who spoke about its mission to honor and perpetuate the legacy of the soldiers of the 10th Mountain Division, past, present and future. Included was the notable impact these soldiers had on the early development of ski resorts in the United States.

10th Mountain Division Foundation

The US Army's 10th Mountain Division was created in 1941 during World War II. It is the only Division of its size in the US military to receive specialized training for fighting in mountainous conditions. The 10th has served in wars since WW II, including Afghanistan and Iraq, and still exists today. World War II veterans of the 10th Mountain Division established the Tenth Mountain Division Foundation in 1958, to memorialize the history and exceptional achievements of the Division, and to perpetuate its legacy for future generations. The completely volunteer board is comprised of descendants and volunteers committed to perpetuating the 10th Mountain legacy and supporting 10th soldiers and their families. It is a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organization. For additional information, their website is located at



Aspen Snowmass was the 2022 recipient of the Tommi Tyndall Award, presented to an industry member that has made a distinguished contribution to skiing. The award was announced at the FWSA Convention in Portland.

Aspen Snowmass was given this award in recognition of its outstanding support of the skiing public, the local community and the Far West Ski Association. The resort has been a devoted supporter of the Far West Ski Association, having donated ski vacation packages to the Annual Convention Silent Auction for thirty-two years. In addition, Aspen Snowmass has been a Convention event sponsor for eleven years, with sponsorships that have included the annual golf tournament, beverages, Awards Banquet, and musical entertainment.

Aspen Snowmass was the Safety Person of the Year Sponsor for five years and for the past six years has sponsored the Environment Award. An early leader in the ski industry in reducing their carbon footprint, Aspen Snowmass proposed the Environment Award for FWSA in 2015. The Environment Award is designed to encourage good stewardship of our environment. The resort desires to inspire and reward creative efforts to conserve and protect our environment.

Strong community, value-led action, and lasting connections with both people and the planet, are important to Aspen Snowmass. The Environment Foundation was established in 1997, and is unique in the ski industry. Employee contributions are matched by the Aspen Skiing Company Family Fund and the Aspen Community Foundation. Additional support is received from Lavazza, their coffee partner. A board of directors, comprised of Aspen Skiing Company employees, governs the foundation and decides which projects to fund. More than 1,600 employees contribute annually to the program, volunteering to contribute through a payroll deduction plan. With employees giving as little as one dollar a week, the foundation has donated more than \$4 million to hundreds of projects since the Foundation's inception. Through the Environment Foundation, they are working to protect habitat, ecosystems, and the biodiversity that they depend upon.

This year, Aspen Snowmass hosted FWSA with another successful North American Ski Week, as they have many times in the past. In addition, Aspen Snowmass has continuously supported the production of the Far West Skier's Guide through advertising support, and donated prizes for club and council events.

Lowell Skoog Awarded FWSA's 2022 Western Ski Heritage Award

Lowell Skoog is a longtime skier, climber, writer and photographer with an avid interest in the skiing history of the Northwest.

He has been involved with the creation of, and is an active member of the Washington State Ski and Snowboard Museum. He is also the chairman of the Mountaineer's History and Library Committee. He created the www.alpenglow.org website dedicated to the history of skiing in the Pacific Northwest. Skoog's years-long historical documentation was most recently published in book form by Mountaineers Books, "Written in the Snows: Across Time on Skis in the Pacific Northwest."

"Written in the Snows" is the first definitive book on the origins and growth of skiing in Washington. The book is illustrated with 150 black-and-white and color photographs. He documents the development of skiing in Washington from the late 1800s to the present, covering the beginnings of ski resorts and competitions, and the importance of wild places in the Cascade and Olympic mountain

The Drake Family Founders and Operators of Mt. Hood Meadows

In 1966, a company headed by Franklin Drake and his two brothers, Donald and Mitchell, edged out a Hood River-based group and secured a 30-year lease from the U.S. Forest Service to build and operate a ski resort on Mt. Hood's east side.

Franklin Drake, an enthusiastic skier himself, used helicopters to haul concrete and steel for the two original chairlifts. He managed to build a lodge, a parking lot, all the infrastructure and the lifts in a year, and opened for business in 1967.

Mt. Hood Meadows now draws about half-a-million people a year, second only to Mt. Bachelor. Drake managed the resort until 2006, when his son, Matthew Drake, took over. Franklin Drake died in 2021.

The Drake family has maintained a philosophy of continuous improvement and development at Mt. Hood Meadows. The ski resort has expanded over the years, and the most notable was the development of the adjacent Heather Canyon Ski Area in the 1980's. In 1984, they began adding triple and quad express lifts.

While Mt. Hood Meadows had always been committed to preserving and maintaining the environment in which it operates, it was in the 1990's when it became recognized as being on the leading edge of these environmental issues.

The resort was the recipient of the National Ski Areas Association's prestigious "Golden Eagle Environmental Excellence Award" in 2015, and received the "Recycler of the Year" from the Association of Oregon Recyclers in 2016.

Mt. Hood Meadows began construction of the new Sahale Lodge in 2019. It is the first significant commercial improvement at the Resort since 1999. The Lodge was designed to add 10,000 square feet for dining and 13,500 square feet for skier services. Sahale is equipped with a heated roof and concrete embedded hydronic snow melt system in the outdoor dining area and entry slabs.

Mt. Hood Meadows was named to the list of "100 Best Companies to Work for in Oregon" by Oregon Business Magazine, as well as, making the Top 100 Green Companies to Work For, marking the seventh year in a row Meadows received the award.

The FWSA Snowsports Builder Award is given to individuals who have made an indelible positive impact on snowsports. The builder may be honored for achievements in athletics, the press, publishers, historians, industry; humanitarian work, area development, or technology: In short, they honor those who have made significant contributions to snowsports.



Mt. Hood Legends Receive FWSA Snowsports Builder Award

Kirk Hanna Operator, Mt. Hood Skibowl & Developer Collins Lake Resort

Kirk Hanna purchased the Mt. Hood Skibowl ski area in 1987. Mt. Hood Skibowl is located just below Government Camp. The resort's origin dates back to 1928, making it one of the oldest remaining ski resorts in the country. The ski area began as two separate resorts -- Skibowl and Multorpor.

While Skibowl's name was derived from the natural shape of its Upper Bowl, Multorpor's name came from the combination Multnomah County, Oregon and Portland.

The famous Jump Hill on Multorpor Mountain was developed by Everett Sickler in 1928 and one year later the newly-formed Cascade Ski Club began holding competitions at Multorpor's Jump Hill. The area gained national recognition after holding an official National Ski Association event.

Kirk Hanna purchased Skibowl out of bankruptcy in 1987 and formed H-Ski Corporation. He made major improvements to the resort by adding the 300 acres outback, cutting the Olympic Certified Reynolds Run and expanding the night skiing to 34 lighted runs, making Skibowl "America's Largest Night Ski Area." He also remodeled and reopened the Historic Warming Hut. Hanna also built upon the summer activities, adding mountain biking, Indy Karts, Miniature Golf, group func-

tions, and some inflatable summer recreation. In 1993, Skibowl added a 100 foot Bungee Tower to its summer attractions. Skibowl's success has been its year-round recreational activities.

The Lower Bowl was completely rebuilt and everything was replaced but towers and chairs. The Upper Bowl also received new improvements. The Multorpor Chair and the Lower Bowl lift terminal are completely rebuilt, resulting in shorter rides, faster chairlifts and more seating.

Kirk Hanna also developed Collins Lake Resort, providing luxury lodging in the heart of Government Camp near Mt. Hood Skibowl.

The Kohnstamm Family Operators of Timberline Lodge & Timberline Ski Area

Richard L. Kohnstamm was the president and area operator of Timberline Lodge and Ski Area from 1955 until 1992, when he turned the operation over to his son, Jeff.

Dick Kohnstamm passed away in 2006. U.S. Representative Earl Blumenauer memorialized him before the House of Representatives as a "visionary leader who conceived and then for half a century led the Kohnstamm family crusade to restore the jewel that is Timberline Lodge".

When he first saw Timberline Lodge in 1955, Dick Kohnstamm was immediately enamored of the building. Built in 1936-1937

under the auspices of the Works Progress Administration, and furnished with art and furniture commissioned under the Federal Art Project, the lodge had opened to the public in 1938. It fell into disrepair and was closed in 1955. The U.S. Forest Service, which administers the lodge, revoked the permit and sought a new operator.

With the encouragement of lodge employee and former WPA worker, Jim Duncan, Kohnstamm applied for and was awarded the permit. He formed R.L.K. and Company and set about developing the lodge and ski area — a labor of love to which he devoted his life.

Kohnstamm installed the Pucci and Victoria Station chairlifts, and he purchased Sno-Cats to transport skiers and tourists to snow fields above the lodge's 6,000-foot elevation. Kohnstamm created the first summer skiing opportunities in North America with the completion of the Palmer chairlift in 1978.

When Kohnstamm lobbied Congress for

funds to build a convention center and day lodge for skiers, he told congressional committees that Timberline was both a hotel and a museum. Running the lodge without a day lodge, he said, was "like trying to run an exclusive restaurant in the Lincoln Memorial." Congress added supplementary funds to the U.S. Forest Service budgets for the new wing and the day lodge, The C.S. Price Wing was completed in 1975, and the Wy'East Day Lodge opened for the 1981-1982 ski season.

Recently, under Jeff Kohnstamm's leadership, Timberline purchased a small ski area called "Summit" in Government Camp. Now called "Summit Pass," the area will be the location of a new day lodge and a new Timberline Gondola that will shuttle guests from the Government Camp area to Timberline Lodge and Ski Area. The Timberline Gondola is the cornerstone of Timberline's Upgrade Plan which was reviewed and accepted by the US Forest Service in 2022.

Mt. Hood is an 11,245' volcano, the tallest mountain in Oregon. Its resorts offer one of the lognest ski seasons in North America, historically beginning the winter season in mid-November and lasting through the end of May. Meteorologists are predicting another La Nina (cold phase) winter for 2022-2023, which would be for a third year in a row. La Nina tends to organize the wintertime jet stream in a way that favors the Pacific Northwest and Northern Tier of states with the most consistent winter snowfall. Looks like it's going to be another great season of skiing and boarding on Mt. Hood! photo of Mt. Hood / Pexels

Vail Resorts

Through its subsidiaries, Vail Resorts has become a leading global mountain resort operator, and currently operates 41 destination mountain resorts throughout the United States. Their stated product is the great outdoors and their mission is "Experience of a LifetimeTM.". The real estate planning and development subsidiary of Vail Resorts is the Vail Resorts Development Company.

In September of 2021, Vail Resorts announced a \$320 Million Capital Plan across 14 resorts to enhance guest experience for the 2022-2023 season. The initiative is called the "Epic Lift Upgrade." Readers are invited to explore and follow progress of all these transformational projects at www.snow.com/Epic LiftUpgrade, which includes videos of the initiatives.

This will be the company's largest singleyear investment into the mountain experience. It is designed to materially reduce wait times, and increase uphill capacity with 19 new chairlifts, including 12 new high-speed chairlifts, a new 8-person high-speed gondola, 6 new fixed-grip chairlifts, new lift-served terrain and an expanded restaurant. It will make getting on and around its mountains easier, faster and more enjoyable.

"Our mission at Vail Resorts is to provide an Experience of a Lifetime to anyone who visits our resorts – and delivering on that mission requires constant re-imagination and investment into the guest experience," said Rob Katz, Chairman of Vail Resorts.

Following are projects planned for the 2022 - 2023 season in Canada and the western region. Note that the projects are subject to government approval, and the completion of each project and its availability for the 2022 - 2023 season will be based on the timing of the approvals.

Whistler Blackcomb, Canada:

A new high-speed 8-person gondola, the Creekside Gondola, will replace the existing 6-person gondola. It will significantly improve wait times and increase out-of-base uphill capacity by 35% in the Creekside area, especially on high-volume days. The replacement of the existing high-speed 4-person lift Big Red Express, with a high-speed, 6-person chair will increase the uphill capacity by nearly 30% and enhance and modernize the guest experience mid-mountain out of the Creekside area.

Vail Mountain, CO:

The installation of a new high-speed 4-person chair in the Sun Down Bowl from the base of Chair 5 (High Noon Express) to the Wildwood restaurant will materially reduce wait times on peak days at Chair 5 and create the opportunity for skiers and riders to much more conveniently access the trails in Sun Down Bowl. Skiers and riders will see improved reliability and capacity in the popular Game Creek Bowl with the replacement of the current 4-person chair with a new high-speed 6-person lift, increasing capacity by nearly 50%. Breckenridge Ski Resort, CO:

The beginner ski and ride school experience will be enhanced at the highly utilized Peak 8 base area by replacing the current fixed-grip double Rip's Ride Lift, with a high-speed 4-person chair, increasing uphill capacity by nearly 70% and improving out-of-base circulation.

Park City Mountain, UT:

A high-speed 6-person chair with a new mid-station will replace the existing Eagle Lift, significantly reducing crowding and wait times, and improving the guest experience, especially for beginner skiers and ski and ride school guests. Vail Resorts' first-ever high-speed 8-person chair, the Silverlode, will replace an existing 6-person chair, and increase uphill capacity by 20% and reduce wait times at a critical spot to circulate guests on mountain. Northstar California, CA:

A new high-speed 6-person chair will replace the existing mid-mountain 4-person chair and is designed to reduce wait times at Comstock Lift, one of the mountain's most popular lifts, and increase uphill capacity by nearly 50%. (www.northstarcalifornia.com)

Heavenly Ski Resort, CA:

The replacement of an existing fixed-grip triple with a high-speed 4-person chair will increase uphill capacity by more than 40% and reduce the combined ride time of the Boulder and North Bowl Lifts, which is expected to reduce wait times at the Stagecoach and Olympic lifts. (www.skiheavenly.com)

Keystone Resort, CO:

Enhancements to Bergman Bowl will include a new high-speed 6-person chairlift, increasing lift-served terrain by 555 acres. Additional enhancements include 16 new trails, a ski patrol facility and snowmaking infrastructure. This project unlocks access for novice and intermediate guests and provides expanded entry to expert terrain in Independence and Erickson Bowls. An approximately 6,000 square feet expansion of the existing Outpost Restaurant will add 300 more indoor seats and 75 more outdoor seats for guests.

Keystone Resort issued an update to its Bergman Bowl Project in early August, 2022. It has been working closely with the U.S. Forest Service on issues that arose during construction. The U.S. Forest Service has approved the resort's restoration plan which is intended to fully restore the affected area in the high alpine. It had been determined that high alpine portions of the project will need to undergo further environmental review and as a result, Keystone will not complete the Bergman Bowl Express lift for the 2022-2023 season. However, it does plan to open Bergman

Bowl for hike-to skiing and riding. Parts of the project that will continue include the expansion of the Outpost Restaurant, as well as, snowmaking and trail work.

Chris Sorensen, VP & GM at Keystone Resort, noted that "Our priority is preserving and caring for our natural environment. We take our role as stewards of the environment and of National Forest Service Land extremely seriously, and we will operate with that at the heart of the work we execute for the restoration plan and the full Bergman Bowl project...We are grateful for the U.S. Forest Service's partnership throughout our work together on this project. We greatly respect their expertise and look forward to working together on both the restoration plan and the supplemental environmental review. We are optimistic that we will be able to complete the Bergman Bowl project next summer for the 2023/24 season." (https://www.keystoneresort.com)

Andermatt-Sedrun Sport AG, Switzerland:

On August 4, 2022 Vail Resorts, Inc. announced that it had closed on its purchase of a majority stake in Andermatt-Sedrun Sport AG, a renowned destination ski resort in Central Switzerland that controls and operates the resort's mountain and ski-related assets including all lifts, most of the restaurants and a ski school operation. This acquisition is Vail Resorts' first strategic investment in, and opportunity to operate, a ski resort in Europe. Andermatt-Sedrun is less than 90 minutes from three of Switzerland's major metropolitan areas (Zurich, Lucerne and Lugano) and approximately two hours from Milan, Italy. It is thought to be one of the most ambitious resort development opportunities in Europe. Vail Resorts' final purchase price of CHF 149 million will be fully reinvested into the resort.

Epic Pass Holders will receive unlimited and unrestricted access to Andermatt-Sedrun (without Matterhorn Gotthard Bahn access) for the upcoming 2022 - 2023 season. Epic Local Pass Holders will receive five days at the resort, and Epic Day Pass Holders with All Resorts Access will be able to visit using any of their days. The Epic Pass also provides European access to partner resorts including five days at Verbier4Vallées in Switzerland, seven days at Les 3 Vallées in France, seven days at Skirama Dolomiti in Italy and three days at Ski Arlberg in Austria. In addition to the Epic Pass products, the local Andermatt-Sedrun-Disentis Annual Pass (ASDA) that will remain available for the 2022 - 2023 ski and ride

Alterra Mountain Company

Alterra Mountain Company is a family of 15 iconic year-round destinations, including the world's largest heli-ski operation, offering the Ikon Pass. It's holdings span six U.S. states and three Canadian provinces. The company owns and operates a range of recreation, hospitality, real estate development, food and beverage, retail, and service businesses and is headquartered in Denver, Colorado. Alterra Mountain Company is rooted in the spirit of the mountains and united by a passion for outdoor adventure. (www.alterramtnco.com/) In late February, 2022, the Alterra Mountain Company announced its largest single year investment of \$334 Million for Capital Improvements, with new gondolas, base area redevelopment and enhanced facilities planned for the 2022 - 2023 winter season. This will bring the money invested in transformational changes over the past five years to over \$1 bil-

lion. With this commitment, the company reaffirms its dedication to enhance the guest experience at its 15 North American destinations

This year's \$344 million plan includes \$237 million in large scale resort development, including \$93 million in increased capacity and terrain expansion, \$91 million in skier services upgrades, and \$16 million in guest experience technology to improve the booking and on-site experience. The largest focus of the annual investment will support five major destinations, including the continuation of major developments at Steamboat, Colorado and Palisades Tahoe, California. In addition, significant multi-year developments will kick off at Deer Valley Resort in Utah, Mammoth Mountain in California, and Crystal Mountain in Washington.

"This historic investment is clear evidence of our commitment to deliver a premier guest experience at our North American destinations and our engagement towards the long-term future of our mountains," said Rusty Gregory, CEO, Alterra Mountain Company.

Steamboat, CO:

Phase 1 of Steamboat's Full Steam Ahead transformation last season brought significant changes, including the relocation of the lower gondola terminal, the installation of escalators and the demolition of Gondola Square to make way for the new Steamboat Square amenities. Phase II will include the relocation of the lower terminal of the Christie Peak Express lift and the first leg of the Wild Blue Gondola, which will take guests to the new Greenhorn Ranch learning center at midmountain. Redevelopment of Steamboat Square continues with The Range Food Hall, Skeeters Ice Rink and slope-side guest amenities including new and expanded restrooms, lockers and more.

With an appreciation for the impact of the construction projects on the environment. the resort has staved focused on four critical strategies to be as green and sustainable as possible.

- Waste Reduction: All steel and concrete materials were recycled during the demolition project for a 70% diversion of demolition waste. For construction, building materials that contain a high level of recycled content are being used.
- Energy Efficiency: In the new base area buildings, steps are being taken to be as efficient with energy and water, as possible. Energy and water use is being monitored in real time, which allows operations to be adjusted to conserve energy and water throughout the day.

■ LEED Certification: All base area buildings will be LEED Certified, which is a rigorous government review process. Therefore, not only will the buildings use less energy, but they will also be healthier for staff and

Palisades Tahoe Ski Resort, CA:

(Formerly Squaw Valley and Alpine Meadows): The highly anticipated \$65 million Base-to-Base Gondola will be completed for the upcoming season. Linking the two legendary base areas has been a dream of many for decades. When completed, it will give skiers and riders a brand new way to access a combined 6,000 acres of storied terrain. It is estimated that Palisades Tahoe will now be the 3rd largest ski resort in North America. Connecting the Olympic Valley and Alpine Meadows Ski Resorts, the base-to-base gondola will climb and descend nearly 2,000 vertical feet over a 16-minute ride offering panoramic views of Lake Tahoe and the Sierra Nevada. It will be the first gondola of its kind in North America, with 4 terminals, 3 of which you can disembark to go ski or snowboard. Additional enhancements include a full replacement of the Red Dog lift, expansion of Guest Education: Guests and staff the Funitel Plaza, and installation of automatic

snowmaking systems at both parts of the resort. (http://gondola.palisadestahoe.com/)


Crystal Mountain, WA:

Over the next five years, \$100 million in infrastructure and service advancements will be invested at Crystal Mountain, and will transform the base of one of the Pacific Northwest's most beloved mountains with a focus on greater access, more space and significantly enhanced skier services. Work began in the spring with a \$25 million investment in additional parking and a new 25,000 sq. ft. skier services facility, called Mountain Commons. The existing skier services building will be replaced with a two-story building, and will include a new guest services and ticketing experience, retail, dining, and an expanded slope-side beach area. The project is expected to open for the 2023 - 2024 winter season.

Mammoth Mountain, CA:

The beginning stage of ground and infrastructure work to facilitate the replacement of two key lifts, Canyon Express (Chair 16) at Canyon Lodge and Broadway Express (Chair 1) at Main Lodge began this summer. These new high-speed six-pack lifts are planned to be operational in winter 2023-2024. Also begun were improvements to the popular Mill Café that includes expansion of indoor dining seats, restrooms, with new furnishings and an exterior refresh. Mammoth began a multiyear snowmaking enhancement program that

includes higher efficiency equipment to open more terrain faster in the early season. In addition, Mammoth initiated a multi-year upgrade at Woolly's Adventure Summit by re-orienting, expanding, and lengthening the tube runs and installing a summer tubing surface for year-round fun. Future phases will include the installation of one of the longest mountain coasters in North America, and the addition of adventure ropes courses and a permanent base lodge with food and beverage services. When complete, it is anticipated that Woolly's will become a year-round adventure center with a variety of activities for kids of all ages. Mammoth Mountain continues to work on the planning and entitlement process for the eventual redevelopment of the Main Lodge and Mammoth Mountain Inn.

Deer Valley Resort, UT:

The renaissance of the Snow Park Village is currently in the permitting process with Park City Municipal. It will create a premier arrival experience designed to transform the base area. Plans include a reimagined plaza and transit arrival with hospitality accommodations, new food and beverage options, retail, and an expansive ski beach. The project is currently planned to break ground in 2023. New for winter 2022 - 2023, the Burns Express chairlift will debut on Deer Valley's Wild West learning area. The new chairlift will connect the Snow Park base area to Little Baldy Mountain, providing an additional option for

skiers to navigate out of the main arrival area and offer Ski School access to more beginner teaching terrain. (www.deervalley.com)

Other Resort Developments Taos Ski Valley, NM:

Taos is in the midst of a "Resort Renaissance" worth \$300 million, which began in 2019, to enhance the guest experience while maintaining the authenticity of the unique destination. The aim was to grow the resort better, not bigger. It included a frontside to backside gondola, plus other major lift upgrades. Snowmaking coverage has been expanded to include 100% of all beginner and intermediate terrain, with the addition of 30 new high-capacity tower guns along with 50 new hydrants. With consideration for all that is environmentally friendly, Taos Ski Valley has also invested in a new food digester to reduce food waste and upgraded the recycling program.

Whitefish Mountain Resort, MT:

The main highlight for the upcoming season is the new Chair 4, the resort's first sixpack lift. The new chair will shuttle an estimated 2,200 guests per hour from the Base Lodge area to the top of Inspiration Ridge, providing a much-needed alternative route to the upper elevations of Big Mountain. The builder, Leitner-Poma, has poured concrete foundations for some of the 25 towers that will support the new lift. A Black Hawk helicopter recently was used to carry wet concrete and

concrete forms to the top of the new lift line. The chopper also hauled away towers from the old Chair 4, which was recently dismantled.

The old Chair 4, a much smaller lift, was installed back in 1978, before the Base Lodge existed. Now the Base Lodge is the primary portal to the mountain, and it's where most of the resort's parking area is located. To reach the upper mountain terrain, guests have had to take Chair 6 from the Base Lodge, followed by either Chair 1 to the summit or Chair 2. The new Chair 4, dubbed the Snow Ghost Express, will provide direct flights to the upper terrain without that layover, and help alleviate traffic on those other lifts.

A trip on the new lift will last just seven minutes and cover 2,200 vertical feet. From the top, guests will be able to shred some frontside runs or head down to Chair 5, where they can then access all of the backside terrain. The \$10 million investment will also improve the skiing experience in the beginner area.

A New Utah Resort is on the Horizon

Mayflower Mountain Resort, UT:

The largest and most important driving force in Utah is the planned new Mayflower Mountain Resort, which will add over 1,000 new skiable acres. In 2018, the owners of the Mayflower Mine sold the majority of their remaining holdings adjacent to Deer Valley Resort to Extell Development of New York. Extell Development had been in negotiations with Deer Valley for several years, planning a major expansion of the resort eastward to the slopes overlooking the Jordanelle. The base village will include the development of up to 5 new ski lifts, three new hotels, as well as, an array of luxury ski-in / ski-out homesites, as well as, a walkable commercial zone. The lifts, runs, and snowmaking infrastructure are currently being designed and constructed, with the first lifts expected to be operational by the 2023-2024 ski season. Their Master Plan, expected to be a long term, 20 to 30 year project, includes some 3 million square feet of commercial and residential development. It would make it ultimately comparable to the nearby Canyons ski area of Park City Resort in overall size.

Safety is Not an Afterthought!

Is Skiing/Riding Safe?

Some people consider skiing or riding to be a dangerous sport, based on watching Olympic events, local news reports, or listening to a friend's experiences. Actually, when participants are trained, follow the rules, and use properly maintained equipment, skiing/riding is a relatively safe sport. Skiers are more likely to be injured in an automobile accident, either driving to or from the ski resort, than they are to be injured on the slopes. According to the National Ski Areas Association, the number of ski related deaths is less than one per million.

Every new skier should be made aware of the Skier's Responsibility Code:

- 1. Always stay in control.
- 2. People ahead of you have the right of way.
- 3. Stop in a safe place for you and others.
- 4. Whenever starting downhill or merging, look uphill and yield.
- 5. Use devices to help prevent runaway equipment.
- 6. Observe signs and warnings, and keep off closed trails.
- 7. Know how to use the lifts safely.

Complementing the Responsibility Code and its seven tenets, there are also three actions every skier and rider can take to help keep themselves and those around safer on the slopes.

1. Be Ready 2. Stay Alert 3. Plan Ahead

Ease up at blind spots, check uphill when merging onto trails, and give other skiers plenty of room when passing. Look out for spots on the run where traffic merges or you can't see what's coming next. If you are unfamiliar with a run, take it easy the first time down it, and make note of places where you'll want to slow down, such as cat tracks and rollers. Also, give other skiers and riders lots or room, especially if you are passing them. There's plenty of space out there, so there's no need to crowd each other.

Following these rules and skiing within your ability can reduce your risk of injury or death. It is a good idea to inspect your equipment for damage and wear. Any damage to the base or edges should be done by a professional, unless you have the knowledge and proper tools to tune your own skis or snowboards. You should inspect your helmet any time after a fall. You may not have been injured, but there may be damage to the helmet, making it less effective. The interior shell can also deteriorate over time. The binding release should be professionally tested, at least annually. Skiers are more likely to be injured when bindings fail to release during a fall. When possible, ski on weekdays, not weekends or holidays, to avoid bigger crowds on the hill. As with any active sport, there are risks, but if you follow the 7 rules of the Skier's Responsibility Code, Be Ready, Stay Alert and Plan Ahead, these risks can be minimized.

WHEREAS, our planet is getting warmer, threatening not just our snowpack, but increasing the number of wildfires, droughts, and devastating storms: and

WHEREAS, the winter sports \$76 billion industry is dependent on consistent winter seasons which have already become shorter and more volatile: and

WHEREAS, the Far West Ski Association (FWSA) membership of approximately 51,000 recreational skiers and riders in the twelve western states of Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming hope to enjoy robust winter seasons for many years to come;

As part of its B-Corp commitment, Taos is on its way to meeting an ambitious goal to reduce its carbon footprint by 20 percent by next year, through investments in more efficient snowmaking and grooming, an electric fleet, and the purchase of carbon offsets for its Taos Air flights. Think about the following for a moment... two of the remaining glaciers in the Alps that have still been offering summer skiing in recent years did not offer it in 2022. Val d'Isère in France announced they won't be opening the lifts on their Pisaillas Glacier for summer skiing and were cancelling 2022 summer ski operations. Then, the Mölltaler Glacier in Austria confirmed that it won't open for snowsports for the summer, either.

The two glaciers are among an ever-diminishing number of ski centers offering summer glacier skiing. The numbers peaked in the 1980s at around 50 resorts, dropped to about 40 by the year 2000, and has now dropped to fewer than 20, and most of those that are still open in summer are open for shorter and shorter periods.

National Ski Patrol -Recruitment Efforts on the Rise

This year marks the start of my 22nd Season as a Member of the National Ski Patrol and Volunteer Patroller at Big Bear Ski Patrol in the Southern California San Bernardino Mountains. The motivation to join is personal to each snowsport/outdoor enthusiast who is inspired to begin this journey. The National Ski Patrol (NSP) in the USA was founded in 1938 by the NSP's first chairman, Charles Minot Dole. "Minnie", as he was known, decided that a "service and safety" organization was in order after he hurt himself skiing at Stowe, Vermont and had trouble evacuating himself from the slope.

The NSP is a dynamic, membership-driven organization. Our goal is to create a more diverse membership and increase our membership participation, both by delivering more knowledge and value to our members and increasing the number of patrols and Patrollers. Education is the cornerstone of NSP's ability to service the public. We develop our education curriculum with the goal

of being the gold standard for volunteer, medically oriented programs. Our education programs must exceed our members' expectations for quality, relevance, and timeliness. The NSP brand is a valued and visible presence in the ski industry and on the hill.

NSP Mission Statement: To help keep people safe on the mountain and during other outdoor activities.

NSP Core Values: Excellence, Service, Camaraderie, Leadership, Integrity, and Responsiveness.

The requirements are clear and obtainable in a single season. Here is how to get started:

- 1. Must be 15 years of age.
- 2. Contact the NSP Patrol Representative (Director) at the local patrol you are interested in joining.
- It is suggested that you attend a Ski with a Patroller (SWAP) event. You will shadow seasoned Patrollers and participate in a ski/ride evaluation at your local resort.
- 4. Create an account at www.nsp.org and join the NSP as a Candidate.
- Once the Patrol Representative (Director) approves your interest, they will add you to their patrol roster.
- 6. Successfully complete the OEC (Outdoor Emergency Care) Course. This is the education program to be a NSP First Responder Patroller. This is usually a 10-week didactic course held in various communities/counties near the resort of your choice.
- 7. Pay your membership fees; NSP, Local, Region and Division Dues.
- Complete all local patrol resort training requirements within the Patroller roles you have selected; Alpine (Hill Patroller), Patroller

- (Base Patroller), Host (Hill Safety, Host Patroller), Bike Patroller (Summer Program).
- 9. Attend and complete all OEC and Local Resort On-The-Hill Refresher Trainings every year. (Source: NSP 2021 Policies and Procedures)

National Ski Patrol education programs offer the chance to learn about emergency care, search and rescue, avalanche control, lift evacuation, mountaineering, toboggan handling, and other interesting topics. Patrollers also receive a free subscription to *Ski Patrol Magazine*, which provides timely information about emergency care techniques, skiing and snowboarding tips, association news, and more. There are special benefits that come with being a NSP Volunteer Patroller. Most Patrollers and their dependents are issued an unlimited season pass for their local resort, plus discounts on equipment.

I am honored to say I am a NSP Patroller. The camaraderie of this organization is unparalleled. I hold my fellow Ski Patrollers whether volunteer or paid staff, in very high regard. We are family. I have taken my patrol career to a new level this year and have recently completed the Instructor Development Mentoring Program to become an Outdoor Emergency Care (OEC) Educator.

I asked my Big Bear Ski Patrol Representative and Far West Division Recruitment Advisor Scott Goodman, to share his thoughts about our incoming Candidates. He stated, "I love the process of meeting people that are interested in patrolling, and following their journey, starting with Outdoor Emergency Care, continuing with their Candidate season, and ultimately earning the coveted Patrol Cross. These new patrol Candidates create lifetime bonds with their instructors, mentors, and classmates."

We will answer the call to rescue in the snow, rain and cold.



Secret Swiss Destinations

CHARMING SKI VILLAGES IN THE **CANTON OF VALAIS**

In all of Europe, there is perhaps no country that is more resistant to change than Switzerland, and the rugged, mountainous canton of Valais in the far western section of the country is certainly typical of the country at large. Some people might call the Swiss conservative, inflexible and dogmatic, while a more sympathetic point of view would describe them as a people steeped in custom and tradition, but it is certain that many things are done here in a very similar fashion to the way it all happened centuries ago.

Tatu Lehmuskalio, Jysky Lehto, and I packed our boards and boots into my old Ford Explorer and embarked on a short road trip through Valais to learn more about this enigmatic section of Switzerland. Of course, we had all been here before, skiing in some of the more famous resorts - Zermatt, Verbier, and the Portes du Soleil - but we understood intuitively that there are a number of deep, back

valleys, small mountain hamlets, ancient cable cars and Poma lifts, and spectacular ski descents that are tucked away into some hidden crevasses of the geology here that rarely get numbers, producing milk and cheese and keepseen by foreign eyes.

The Swiss, after all, are extremely selfsufficient, as they have always been, and don't really need international tourism. They might be happy to have a lot of foreign money resting in their bank vaults, but they are just as happy if the investors make their deposits and withdrawals with a simple phone call from abroad without transgressing the sanctity of the local soil.

The Swiss attitude seems to be similar when it comes to skiing. While the Austrians, Italians, and French work diligently hand-inhand with foreign travel agencies to promote their indigenous ski and tourist industries, the Swiss seem quite satisfied to keep many of their best ski locations top secret.

They have stayed out of foreign wars for a thousand years or so, letting their beloved mountains protect them from invasion and in-

trusion, and they are certainly better off for their isolation.

Their cows still roam the alms in great ing food on everybody's table. Everyone in the country has a precision Swiss-made timepiece on their wrist to ensure that daily life will function with the same efficiency and punctuality that it always has. So why on Earth would the Swiss citizens be interested in opening their little paradise to a bunch of foreigners?

It is quite understandable that they have stayed out of the European Union – not wanting a bunch of external politicians in Brussels to decide over them, and it is equally clear to me that they have for years kept some of the world's best ski terrain clandestine from foreign intervention. Tatu, Jysky, and I, however, invaded the sanctity of Valais in an attempt to uncover some of the stunning scenery, quaint villages, and here-to-fore little-known freeride terrain that has not yet been overrun and destroyed by the masses.

EUROPE'S LONGEST GLACIER

The first stop on our short road trip was the little village of Fiesch (1049 m), nestled into the Goms Valley, and connected by ski lift with the car-free villages of Bettmeralp and Riederalp. Here the Eggishorn (2926 m) rises almost two vertical kilometers above the valley floor, and offers a stunning panorama of the Aletsch Glacier. If you don't come here for the skiing, you could well visit for the view alone. The Aletsch is not your ordinary glacier. With a length of 23 kilometers and a surface area of 85 square kilometers, it is the longest and largest glacier in the Alps – a virtual river of ice that begins at the base of the famous Jungfrau and flows past the Eggishorn toward the Rhone Valley. In 2001, the glacier along with the Jungfrau was named as the Alps' first UNESCO World Heritage site, and one can view almost the entire area from the top of the peak.

It was not so odd that the Eggishorn became the first stop on our trip. From there, the famous Jungfrau (4158 m) was actually dwarfed by a number of big sisters, as the panorama surrounding the glacier includes the Monte Rosa (4643 m), the Alphubel (4206 m), lower elevations of the Aletsch Glacier offers lift service to reach the lower trails nearbu.

the Mischabel Dom (4545 m), the Nadelhorn (4327 m), the Matterhorn (4478 m), the Weisshorn (4506 m), the Grand Combin (4314 m), the Aletschhorn (4205 m), the Finsteraarhorn (4274 m), and even Mt. Blanc (4808 m). Almost forgotten among all these mountains is the Fiescher Glacier, just a stone's throw to the northeast of the Eggishorn, which, at a length of 16 kilometers, is the second longest glacier in the Alps. Suffice it to say that there is enough spectacular mountain scenery in this corner of the Alps to keep a mountain aficionado busy for quite some time.


Our lookout point was not the most hospitable location on the mountain. The wind was picking up, storm clouds were brewing and it was time to generate some body heat by moving. We spent the day skiing around the pistes. There are some interesting off-piste possibilities in this area, but the conditions did not allow any exploration. We knew that our time

here was limited and made an immediate mental note to return sometime in the summer when the snow-free glacier is even more visually impressive and the list of nearby hikes is almost endless.

We enjoyed the village of Bettmeralp, where the vehicle-less streets are covered with snow and one can ski through the main street to find a suitable lunch spot. Cheese specialties are indigenous to all parts of Switzerland, and the Goms Valley is also known for their dried sausages and hams. We started with a small assortment of dried meats followed by a cheese fondue.

During lunch, one of the locals threw a few more interesting statistics about the glacier at us. At its thickest point, it is about 900 meters deep, and the weight of the ice is estimated to be 27 billion tons. If that ice were to melt, it would provide a liter of water for every human being on Earth each day for six years!

While these kinds of large numbers are very impressive, a few smaller numbers, on the other hand, gave us reason to take pause and feel uneasy. Like virtually all of the world's glaciers, the Aletsch receded 100 meters in only one year during the past decade, and it has lost 3.5 kilometers of length and 300 meters of depth over the past 300 years.

The times have certainly changed. In olden times, the homes of Fiesch were forever threatened by floods, caused when blocks of ice from the glacier fell into the nearby Märjelensee. Ultimately, in 1678, the villagers began praying for the glacier to recede and promised to live virtuous lives in exchange for their prayers being answered. Their prayer was officially sent to Pope Innocent XI in the 17th century, and locals even began an annual five-hour march to a nearby church in the mid-1800s to back up their prayers with actions.

Today, the villagers have seen that a reversal of their prayer is necessary and they have once again asked the Pope to sanction their prayers – this time for the glacier to grow once more. Tatu, Jysky, and I are not really complete believers in divine intervention, and decided that we had best do as much skiing as we can on this trip. One can never know what tomorrow may bring. Even if a new ice age approaches, we would require a tad of divine intervention of our own to be allowed to enjoy the snowy fruits of a new epoch of ice. For the present, it was time to move on to our second destination in Valais – the Lötschental – and keep skiing.



THE LÖTSCHENTAL -BEAT'S PRIVATE **PARADISE**

Not far from Fiesch, in a parallel valley just to the north, is the Lötschental. This little-known region is comprised of the villages of Ferden, Kippel, Wiler, Blatten, Kühmad, and Fafleralp – a short list of villages that are certainly not even household names in Zurich or Geneva.

From Wiler (1419 m), a series of four lifts takes skiers up to the Hockenhorngrat (3111 m). These lifts are more or less all there is, but one really doesn't need anything more. The Hockenhorngrat is one of those rare

peaks where a well-situated top station opens up more off-piste terrain than many ski areas with five times as many lifts can offer. The uppermost gondola was constructed just a few years ago, transforming the Lötschental from a rather ordinary small and unknown ski area into an extraordinary, but still small and unknown freeride mountain that offers countless possibilities.

As Tatu, Jysky, and I rode up the first cable car, everyone around us was speaking in some sort of Swiss dialect that only a local mountain goat could understand. It was clear that the secret of the Lötschental had still not passed beyond the border. But there is one

Swiss local who, swimming against the stream, is interested in getting the word out. That is Beat Dietrich. This is a true three-ring circus of freeride terrain, and Beat is the ringmaster. Fortunately, we had Beat at our disposal for the next two days to show us around his little paradise.

Beat is the head of the local ski school. In addition, a few years ago, aware of the plans to build a new lift that would open up a plethora of off-piste options, he bought the Lötschenpass Hütte (2690 m). This is a sturdy building situated atop the pass of the same name, about a 40-minute traverse, hike and ski from the top station of the gondola. From the hut, freeride routes descend in a variety of directions.

An hour's hike with skins brings skiers to the Gitzefurgge, from where they can ski to

Leukerbad to the southwest. Directly from the pass, there is a very difficult route down to Kandersteg to the north. And to the south, are a whole slew of ridges, bowls, and valleys that descend to Ferden, Kippel, Wiler, or back to the middle station.

We could have benefitted from some fresh snow and a full week of vacation to get a real idea of what the Lötschental had to offer. We had neither, and to seek an audience with the Pope at this moment seemed rather fruitless. We did, however, have Beat to guide us, and in the Lötschental, that may well be more valuable than either the Vatican or thehand of God! The conditions were much too dangerous for the run to Kandersteg, but some corn snow was beginning to develop on the south faces, and Beat led us first on a cornsnow run back to the middle station, and later

on a lovely descent all the way down to Ferden.

Our corn snow adventures were followed by another headfirst dive into the local cuisine, with a *raclette* lunch, a meal that originates in Valais. Lo and behold, by the time we had digested the cheese to the extent that we were ready to reemerge from the hut, the fickle March weather had answered my prayers and snow was puking down. By the time an hour had passed, the sun again lit up the slopes to reveal a nice layer of boot-top powder all around us.

To enjoy this little March surprise, we didn't even need Beat's assistance. There was fresh snow wherever we pointed our skis, and we were almost alone on the slopes. I was beginning to be smugly pleased about the Swiss penchant for keeping a secret.

SAINT - LUC AND CHANDOLIN -

The final stop on our short road trip was to the linked villages of Saint-Luc and Chandolin in the Val d'Anniviers. These two ski areas are primarily south facing, and we expected to have the chance to ski some spring snow. But now that my powder pleas had been heard, there was no way to backtrack on my wish. I could only hope that the villagers of Fiesch would have better luck at redirecting their vow from the 17th century.

The erratic March weather followed us from the Lötschental and we awoke to sunshine and about 20 centimeters of fresh snow in Saint-Luc, a picturesque village of classic Walliser houses. I stepped onto the veranda of my bedroom in the charming hotel La Pension to admire the Matterhorn across the valley. While Zermatt is without question one of the most beautiful ski resorts in the world, here I could see the Horn without having to share the view with the crowds. It was Easter week, and the pistes were full of young children, but away from the marked trails, we were again almost alone.

The ski area is comprised almost entirely of old Poma lifts with one train from the village and a couple of older chairlifts. While the Poma springs needed some oil and had a tendency to nearly jerk my arms out of their sockets, by now I was in harmony with the the lower mount steep couloirs tuc. We warmed up we cruiser from the down the Pas down the Pas

whole Swiss way of life. With no new investment in lifts and infrastructure, no additional customers were necessary . . . hence no marketing, empty slopes, and lots of virgin powder.

The area offered an excellent combination of open upper slopes and tree-skiing on the lower mountain. It even had a number of steep couloirs tucked away between the pistes. We warmed up with a 1200-vertical-meter-long cruiser from the highest lift, the Bella Tola, down the Pas de Boeuf and then we were ready to explore

Departing the Bella Tola in the opposite direction, to the southwest, we were completely alone – fresh tracks to be made everywhere. I don't think we could have possibly used up the powder there if we had stayed a week, but we wanted to see the whole area. There was so much to explore – an excursion down the north face from Bella Tola, a ski tour to the spectacular peak of Tounot and its couloir, and the Illhorn Couloir were all on our list.

Some of the steepest chutes in the area

go down the north side along the Arete des Ombreintses, and we began with one of them. The snow was relatively stable, but halfway down, the weather took a turn for the worse. The clouds closed back in, the light got flat, and it was time to drop into the trees. We found some lovely tree skiing off the Rotzé and the Tsape lifts and played in the forest for the rest of the day. That kept us below the clouds.

The following day was our final one in Valais. The snow had continued to fall during the night, and some of the steep alternatives we had hoped for would be too avalanche dangerous. It didn't matter much. There was plenty of untouched snow within spitting distance of the trails. We didn't need any secret back valleys or steep chutes to make first tracks. This was skiing as it had been intended by God or Mother Nature — the way it had been before man intervened by building ski lifts helter-skelter all over the Alps, bringing droves of people to clutter the slopes.

I had only spent five days in Valais, but I had reached a true understanding of the retroconservative Swiss mentality.

Inflexible? Stand up for what you believe in.

Dogmatic? If the system works, don't change it.

Old-fashioned? That makes them quaint, right?

Backwards? Backwards doesn't necessarily mean bad.

Antiquated? Why build new lifts if the old ones still function adequately? Anachronistic? Yes, sir. Me too!

If I could, I would happily hop in my time machine and set the date for 1935. I would land in some idyllic mountain village untouched by the modern-day ski industry. I would stroll through the narrow alleyways of a cozy village amidst old wooden houses with stone roofs until I found a local farmer to guide me. We would skin up the nearby peaks and glide back down through pristine virgin fields of snow. There would be nobody else in the vicinity except us.

I don't have a time machine, but it doesn't really matter much. I can travel, instead, to Valais, find Beat and have him lead me through his own private world of the Lötschental or I can wander through the old cobblestone streets of Saint-Luc, ride up their ancient Pomas and ski in solitude through virgin meadows of white on either side of the piste. That part is easy. I still may have to seek an audience with the Pope, however, to insure a continuation of white winters.

What is a Snow**sports Council?**

In its most general case, a snowsports council is an organization composed of clubs and individuals who have continuing interests and objectives in common. The interests may include race scheduling, fundraising, social events, off-season sports, travel, government affairs and communication, both internal and with other entities. It is normally centered on population centers because the travel distances required for monthly meeting attendance is lessened. Historically, the oldest councils operated independently of national or regional organizations and then joined the Far West Ski Association, (FWSA), founded in 1930 as the California Ski Association.

The Far West Ski Association has ten councils and they collectively make up the region that it calls its service area, extending from Alaska to the southern border and from the Colorado border to Hawaii. New councils may be added at the discretion of the FWSA Board of Directors if the candidate council can be effectively served.

The original four councils in FWSA were the Bay Area Snow Sports Council (formerly Bay Area Council of Ski Clubs), Los Angeles Council of Ski Clubs (formerly Southern Council), Central Council of California (formerly a district of the California Ski Association), and San Diego Council of Ski Clubs. The Orange Council of Ski Clubs originated from the Los Angeles Council in 1971. Northwest Ski Club Council (formerly Portland Area Ski Club Council) joined in 1982 and Arizona Ski Council in 1993. Sierra League and Council (formerly Sierra Ski Racing League) joined in 2002. The newest councils are Intermountain Ski Council, joining in 2007, and the National Brotherhood of Skiers - Western Region, joining in 2018. NBSWR is a region of the National Brotherhood of Skiers, one of the largest ski organizations in the country.

The FWSA Council/Club Section lists all the member clubs in each of the ten councils. The clubs offer a wide variety of activities, which include not only winter snowsports trips, but programs for all seasons of the year. There are plenty of social activities and the opportunity to support your community through various projects. In addition, as a club member, you become a member of the council and Far West Ski Association, eligible for member benefits, an extensive travel program, racing in the Far West Racing Association, attending the Annual FWSA Convention plus much more! Also, our councils are part of the National Ski Council Federation, which represents councils throughout the nation, with its own activities and programs. Find a club near you and visit a meeting. The Annual Summit is a fundraiser that supports the NBS Olympic Scholarship Fund and its mission to identify, develop and support athletes of color who will compete in Olympic and international winter sports competitions, representing the United States, and increase participation in winter sports. There are four regions within the NBS, the western, rocky mountain, mid-west, and eastern regions. Each region has a Vice President and Board of Directors and report to the current NBS President, Henry Rivers.

NBSWR members attended the Induction ceremony of founders Ben Finley and Art Clay into the US Ski & Snowboard Hall of Fame, and honored one of their Western Region founding clubs, All Seasons Ski & Snowboard Club in Oakland, CA. The NBS and NBSWR have recognized them for their service and commitment to promoting, enhancing, and providing recreational opportunities in Winter Snowsports within the African American and minority communities. All Seasons Ski Club was formed in 1972 by a small pioneering group of African American skiers who encountered few like themselves on the slopes. In 1974, ASSC and 11 other ski clubs across the US founded their national umbrella organization, the NBS. The club offers group ski packages to venues all over the world, social outings, activities, and networking opportunities to reflect the diverse interests of our members - single and married, male and female, skiers, boarders, mono-skiers, and non-skiers alike. The National Brotherhood Skiers Western Region (NBSWR) covers California, Nevada, Arizona, Oregon, and Washington and is currently comprised of 14 member clubs serving their area communities. Many of our member clubs have year-round adult and family activities from skiing, Alpine and Nordic, snowmobiling, bicycling, hiking, camping, river rafting, houseboating, and attending jazz festivals. "We are focused on the growth and prosperity of our clubs, supporting the mission of the NBS, promoting diversity in snowsports with passion, unity, and harmony through fun and education." - David Geiger, Vice President NBSWR.

Currently, the NBSWR is in full swing marketing and preparing for an entire week of snowsports activities and fun at the NBS 50th Anniversary Summit to be held February 4-11, 2023, at Vail Resort in Colorado.
